Key findings suggest that incorporating subjects such as renewable energy, sustainable agriculture, waste management, and green entrepreneurship into the curriculum can enhance students' understanding and capabilities in these areas. Additionally, the study underscores the importance of teacher training and capacity building to ensure effective delivery of green economy content. By aligning education with green economy needs, Nigeria can build a resilient, sustainable economy that not only addresses environmental challenges but also creates new job opportunities and drives economic growth. The paper concludes with recommendations for policymakers, educators, and stakeholders on implementing curriculum reforms that support sustainable economic transformation. These recommendations include developing partnerships between educational institutions, government, and industry to ensure a comprehensive and practical approach to curriculum development. Overall, this study advocates for a holistic educational reform that prepares Nigeria's future workforce to thrive in a green economy, thereby contributing to sustainable national development.

Introduction

In the face of escalating environmental challenges and the urgent need for sustainable development, the concept of a green economy has emerged as a vital pathway to achieving long-term economic stability and ecological health. A green economy emphasizes reducing environmental risks and ecological scarcities while fostering economic growth, social inclusion, and human well-being. Education is central to this transformative agenda, which is crucial in equipping individuals with the knowledge, skills, and values necessary to drive and sustain green economic practices. Education serves as the foundation for sustainable economic transformation by preparing the workforce for emerging green sectors and embedding a culture of sustainability within society. Morritz et al (2020) opined that the correlation of a nation's education system and its economic development applies to countries worldwide. The educational aspect within human capital, expenditures into the education sector, and education quality are vital aspects of a nation's socioeconomic development process

However, achieving this requires a fundamental realignment of educational curricula to meet the specific needs of the green economy. This involves integrating topics such as renewable energy, sustainable agriculture, waste management, and environmental stewardship into the education system, thereby ensuring that students are well-prepared for the challenges and opportunities of a green economy. Nigeria, with its rich natural resources and dynamic youth population, is uniquely positioned to benefit from aligning its educational system with green economy needs. Despite the country's abundant potential, there are significant gaps in the current education system regarding sustainability and green practices. Addressing these gaps through comprehensive curriculum reforms, enhanced teacher training, and supportive policies can propel Nigeria towards a sustainable economic future.

Clarification of Concepts

Education is a vital tool to growth and development. It is indeed a catalyst to economic transformation. No society or nation can develop without an adequate educational system. Education is imperative to economic growth and development, poverty reduction, gender equality, public health, the transformation to sustainable production and consumption (Obodoagu, 2023).

According to the Federal Republic of Nigeria (FRN), as cited in Obodoagu et al (2023), Nigeria's educational system is a "par excellence" tool for promoting national development. Obodoagu et al stated further that education aims to develop people's intellectual capacities, promote civil engagement and prepare them for active participation in the political and

economic sphere. Education is a process of facilitating learning, or the acquisition of knowledge, skills, values, beliefs, and habits. It encompasses a range of activities, including teaching, training, storytelling, discussion, and directed research. Educational methods include various forms of pedagogy, such as formal instruction in schools, colleges, and universities, as well as informal and non-formal education through self-directed learning, community education, and life experiences.

Economic Transformation

Economic transformation is a term used to describe important structural change within a country. Economic transformation can be defined as a broad-based shift from low productivity to high-productivity activities e.g. from low-value-added agriculture to manufacturing and service sectors which have higher output per person employed (Tutor2u, 2023). As Wikipedia (2023) puts it, economic transformation refers to the continuous process of moving labour and other resources from lower- to higher-productivity sectors (structural change) and raising within-sector productivity growth. As such, economic transformation emphasizes the movement from low- to high-productivity activities within and across all sectors (which can be tasks or activities that are combinations of agriculture, manufacturing and services). This movement of resources from lower- to higher-productivity activities is a key driver of economic development.

Within-sector productivity growth (also called 'sector transformation') entails adopting new technologies and management practices that increase production efficiency. It can come about as a result of the increased efficiency of existing firms or as a result of the reallocation of resources away from the least productive firms towards more productive firms. McMillan et al (2017) Economic transformation is a process of moving labour and other resources from lower- to higher productivity activities. This includes moving resources between sectors to higher-value activities (e.g. from agriculture to manufacturing) but also equivalent change within sectors e.g. from low-productivity subsistence farming to high-value crops within sophisticated value chains)

Increasingly, the goals of economic development policy-making in low- and middle-income countries extend beyond sustained growth and poverty reduction. Government economic strategists are concerned to set their countries on a path leading to economic transformation, defined as a process of structural change in which labour and other resources move progressively from low- to higher-productivity sectors and activities. Transformation involves moving resources both between sectors (e.g. from agriculture to manufacturing) and within

sectors (from lower- to higher-productivity farms or firms). Usually, it involves product diversification and new export activities (Dirk et al, 2016).

Measures of Economic Transformation

Economic transformation can be measured using a variety of indicators that assess changes in the structure, productivity, and sustainability of an economy. The key measures included:

1. **GDP Growth and Composition:** Analyzing changes in the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and its composition can reveal shifts from agriculture-based to industrial and service-based economies. Higher contributions from industry and services often indicate economic transformation.
2. **Productivity Growth:** Increases in labor productivity (output per worker) and total factor productivity (efficiency in using labor and capital) are critical indicators of economic transformation. Higher productivity often reflects technological advancements and improved business practices.
3. **Employment Shifts:** Tracking changes in employment across different sectors can show a move from low-productivity agricultural jobs to higher-productivity industrial and service jobs. This shift is a hallmark of economic transformation.
4. **Industrial Diversification:** The diversification of the industrial base, with the development of new industries and a move away from dependence on a few sectors, indicates a more resilient and dynamic economy.
5. **Innovation and Technology Adoption:** Measures of research and development (R&D) spending, patent filings, and the adoption of new technologies reflect the economy's capacity for innovation and technological progress.
6. **Human Capital Development:** Indicators such as education levels, vocational training enrollment, and workforce skills development show the economy's investment in human capital, which is crucial for sustainable growth.
7. **Infrastructure Development:** Improvements in infrastructure, such as transportation, energy, and communication networks, support economic transformation by enhancing productivity and connectivity.

The second World Summit on Sustainable Development (WSSD) convened in Johannesburg in 2002 recognized that education had the potential to play a major role in the future realization of a ‘vision of sustainability that links economic well-being with respect for cultural diversity, the Earth and its resources’ (UNESCO, as cited in Little & Green, 2009). The role of education economic transformation includes the following.

Educational institutions must adapt their curricula to include these emerging fields, ensuring that students are well-prepared for the jobs of the future.

By integrating sustainability into the curriculum, schools can cultivate a generation of environmentally conscious individuals who prioritize sustainable practices in their personal and professional lives.

By encouraging research and development in green technologies and practices, educational institutions can contribute to the advancement of sustainable solutions

Green Economy and its Relevance in Nigeria

The notion of a green economy involves a fundamental departure from traditional economic models, which frequently place more emphasis on short-term gains at the expense of long-term environmental consequences. Instead, a green economy fosters economic development while ensuring that natural resources continue to provide the resources and environmental services that are essential to human well-being. It seeks to balance human activities with the earth's ecological capacity, promoting practices that reduce ecological risks and scarcities. Reducing greenhouse gas emissions and combating climate change are key goals of the green economy, which is centered on the switch to renewable energy sources like solar, wind, and hydropower. By generating new businesses and jobs in the renewable energy sector, this change solves environmental issues and boosts economic activity. Moreover, energy-saving methods are essential since they cut down on the energy needed to deliver goods and services. Otar (2024) opined that the green economy plays a crucial role when it comes to nurturing sustainable development and tackling environmental issues. Its principles are focused on combatting climate change and green economy solutions are both commercially viable and environmentally sound. Moreover, a green economy advocates for the efficient use of resources, waste reduction, and minimizing negative impacts on the environment. It also supports the utilization of renewable energy sources, thus leading countries toward greater energy security, while ensuring the creation of green jobs, equity, and more social inclusion. The green economy, as defined by United Nations Environment Programme as cited in the Republic (2022), is one that results in improved human well-being and social equity, while significantly reducing environmental risks and ecological scarcities. An inclusive green economy is a thriving economy that delivers considerable economic, social and environmental benefits sought by the Sustainable Development Goals and the Paris Agreement. This development path should maintain, enhance and, where necessary, rebuild natural capital as a critical economic asset and source of public benefits, especially for underprivileged people whose livelihoods and security depend strongly on nature. The Republic stated further that practically speaking, green economy initiatives include programmes such as feed-in tariffs in

Kenya, organic agriculture in Uganda, the Tunisian solar programme, the Agulhas ecotourism in South Africa and the Brazilian biofuel policy. Such initiatives continue to impact people's everyday lives, evident in reduction in greenhouse gas emissions, decrease in environmental emergencies, creation of economic opportunities, availability of more green jobs, improved human well-being, promotion of social inclusivity, and sustainable livelihoods. A pragmatic approach to the green economy is required to tailor strategies for solving the most important problems facing Nigeria today.

An additional pillar of the green economy is sustainable agriculture. This farming method places a strong emphasis on techniques that safeguard ecosystems, improve soil fertility, and encourage biodiversity. It is imperative involving teachers, students, parents, and community members in the development process, Providing ongoing training and support for teachers. Curriculum development and implementation are critical processes in education that ensure students receive a relevant, effective, and comprehensive learning experience. It is however not known the extent to which all these constraints jeopardize effective curriculum development and implementation in Nigeria resistance to change: Teachers and institutions may resist changes to the curriculum,
