This analysis explores the current state of Nigeria's educational framework, highlighting inherent deficiencies and challenges that hinder its efficacy in fostering ethical reorientation, while also suggesting reforms aimed at enhancing this critical aspect of education. The conclusion drawn is that Nigeria's socio-economic and political challenges are likely to endure unless there is a concerted effort to prioritize ethical development within the educational framework. It advocates for reforms in policy and curriculum, enhancements in teacher training, and strategies for community engagement to cultivate a more ethically oriented educational system. As a result, it promotes extensive reforms that emphasize the importance of ethical and moral education, rooted in a teacher-centered, adequately funded, and inclusive framework.

Quality education undeniably serves as a catalyst for societal progress. Moreover, the settlement of societal challenges can be attained through high-quality education.

This assertion indicates that quality education is a powerful instrument for national progress. It also indicates that quality education has the capacity to heal or harm, unite or divide, uplift or dismiss. In essence, it is an instrument that can be utilized for either altruistic or malicious objectives.

In the 21st century, quality education encompasses not only the acquisition of knowledge and skills for economic progress but also the cultivation of moral integrity, ethical reasoning, and social responsibility. Quality education provides individuals with the intellectual and ethical foundation required for positive societal contributions. The primary focus of quality education may be regarded as the development of values, as the fundamental nature of education is compromised when it is deprived of the opportunity to promote ideals or principles. Education is perceived to confer benefits and value to both individuals and society. This assumption is prevalent worldwide. In Nigeria, the present condition of the educational system presents considerable obstacles to its function in ethical and value reorientation (Adeyemi, 2014). Moral deterioration has profoundly affected Nigeria's educational system, which functions as a catalyst for individual and societal development and a conduit for the transmission of societal values. Destructive activities, such as examination malpractice, sorting, cultism, substance abuse, sexual misconduct, and tardy dressing, have become prominent issues inside modern educational institutions (Amaele, 2010). This highlights the ongoing issue of immorality encountered by Nigerians, more than sixty years postdemocracy. Currently, there has been a notable deterioration in values among both youth and older generations, who are anticipated to act as custodians, mentors, and exemplars of values by their actions. The present condition of our society is marked by a deficiency of value and ethical decline, resulting in individuals lacking a stable framework to direct their acts or make reasoned choices regarding their life.

It is unfortunate that the Nigerian educational system has not sufficiently addressed concerns related to ethical growth. Violent protests, cult activities, substance abuse, prostitution, nudity, gambling, tribalism, examination malpractice, and many forms of indiscipline have become widespread in the Nigerian educational system. Educational institutions in the country frequently encounter various sorts of unethical conduct by both educators and students during

academic sessions. Morality must be upheld in our educational institutions, as an atmosphere of immorality will hinder the achievement of educational aims and objectives. It is alarming that our educational system, rather than fulfilling its stated objective of fostering social order and stability through the inculcation of acceptable norms, has instead played a role in the decline of our values rather than their maintenance. In light of this context, this research investigates the connection between the reorientation of ethical values and the quality of education in Nigeria. This analysis evaluates the current state of the Nigerian education system, explores the challenges that hinder its ability to provide value-oriented education, and proposes strategies for reform. This research examines the potential for Nigeria to leverage education as a means of reinstating ethical principles and values among its populace, with a focus on the unique context of Nigeria. This investigation will begin with an effort to clarify or elucidate the diverse subjects relevant to the discourse.

### **Quality Education**

Quality education encompasses a complex array of elements that extend beyond mere knowledge transfer. This approach to education integrates the development of cognitive, emotional, social, and moral capacities hastily. Quality education encompasses an educational framework that guarantees the attainment of knowledge while also fostering critical thinking, ethical growth, and a commitment to lifelong learning. Education should align with societal needs, honor cultural diversity, and promote both individual and collective well-being. UNESCO (2020) states that quality education equips individuals with the essential skills, knowledge, and values needed to lead fulfilling lives and make significant contributions to society. The process also encompasses the development of critical thinking, creativity, emotional intelligence, and, crucially, moral and ethical awareness (UNESCO, 2020).

Quality education transcends academic achievement and the mere gathering of information. This education equips students with the necessary tools to address and resolve the challenges facing humanity. The United Nations emphasizes that quality education ought to be inclusive and equitable, encouraging lifelong learning and the development of values such as tolerance, empathy, and critical thinking (UNESCO, 2020). It should also highlight values such as forgiveness, responsibility, and justice. For the delivery of quality education, it is essential to have well-trained educators, a suitable curriculum, a supportive learning environment, and sufficient resources. In Nigeria, quality education should include not only formal learning, but also moral and ethical teachings that empower students to make positive contributions to society. It should foster not only academic achievement but also cultivate values such as

integrity, respect for the rule of law, empathy, and civic responsibility. Regrettably, the Nigerian educational system has come under scrutiny for prioritizing rote memorization and examination outcomes over the cultivation of ethical and moral reasoning (Adeyemi, 2014). Therefore, it is imperative for the education system to recalibrate its emphasis on ethics and values.

### **Ethics**

Ethics has been articulated through a multitude of definitions. The term “ethics” finds its roots in the Greek word “ethos,” which signifies customs, norms, habits, or the accepted modes of behavior, particularly within the context of an individual or a community. The term "ethos" is equivalent to “moral” in both its conceptual framework and its semantic implications. This elucidates the reason some thinkers characterize ethics merely as a moral philosophy. Shields (2004) articulate that ethics encompasses a deliberate and intentional conduct that pertains to the obligations and regulations associated with it. This implies that the study of ethics seeks to identify the elements that determine the classification of actions as good or bad, right or wrong, for both individuals and social groups. It engages with both theoretical frameworks and practical applications.

Ozumba (2001), argued that ethics is characterized as a segment of philosophy referred to as moral philosophy, which involves the contemplation of morality through a philosophical lens. This indicates that ethics fundamentally revolves around the contemplation of moral principles and attitudes concerning various aspects of existence. This definition articulates ethics as a domain within philosophy that primarily examines the morality inherent in human actions and behavior. Ozumba is not isolated in his perspective, as a consensus among many scholars suggests that ethics primarily concerns human actions and the concept of morality. Consequently, ethics can be characterized as a methodical inquiry into the standards governing human conduct. This definition illustrates that ethics fundamentally pertains to human concerns. It denotes a specific code of conduct or a collection of principles guiding human behavior. In this context, certain scholars characterize ethics as the foundational tenets of moral law or guidance. It is important to recognize that this definition implies that ethics encompasses a framework for evaluating moral values. It advocates for the relentless pursuit of moral truth, irrespective of the circumstances.

### **Ethical and Moral Reorientation**

Ethical reorientation according to Nwagwu (2015) denotes the endeavor to realign both personal and collective values with ethical standards that foster fairness, justice, and integrity.

Ethical reorientation signifies the process of reinstating ethical norms within a society, thereby realigning both individual and collective conduct with the established standards of right and wrong. Ethical reorientation denotes the process of reshaping the moral and ethical perspectives of individuals to harmonize with societal standards that advocate for justice, fairness, and integrity. Ethical reorientation denotes the endeavor to realign individuals' moral frameworks to conform to established societal standards, fostering principles such as integrity, equity, impartiality, and accountability.

In Nigeria, a landscape marked by corruption, nepotism, and materialism, there exists a pressing necessity for a profound ethical reorientation. The imperative for a profound ethical reorientation in Nigeria has reached an unprecedented level of urgency. The disintegration of societal values has led to the acceptance of unethical conduct in politics, business, and daily existence. In recent decades, the nation has experienced a gradual deterioration of ethical standards, further intensified by the prevalence of corruption, nepotism, and materialism (Nwagwu, 2015).

### **Role of Education in Ethical and Moral Reorientation**

Education functions as the foremost institution for ethical reorientation, equipping students not merely for careers but also cultivating them into responsible citizens who actively contribute to national development. This process is fundamental to the transformation, as it educates students on the distinctions between right and wrong, aids in the development of a moral compass, and fosters a sense of civic responsibility. It also possesses the capacity to mitigate immorality by cultivating a new cohort of Nigerians who prioritize integrity, accountability, and social responsibility (Nwagwu, 2015).

The educational framework serves as an essential instrument in this process of reorientation. Educational institutions bear the crucial responsibility of molding the forthcoming generation of Nigerians by embedding principles such as honesty, integrity, and reverence for the rule of law. This has consistently served as a significant instrument for social interaction, influencing the ethical and moral underpinnings of individuals. In numerous cultures, educational institutions are regarded as environments where moral principles are instilled. This environment functions as a crucial arena for the transmission of values and is predominantly regarded as a fertile ground for value-oriented education. Students not only equip themselves for professional endeavors but also cultivate ethical conduct and participate in the development of their nation. From the foundational stages of early childhood education to the complexities of tertiary education, educational institutions bear the crucial responsibility of cultivating

values such as discipline, diligence, and ethical reasoning. Beyond the transmission of academic knowledge, educational institutions must guarantee that students comprehend their responsibilities as ethical participants within society. By implementing a curriculum that weaves together moral education, learners come to appreciate the significance of honesty, respect, and diligence. These principles are essential for fostering accountable individuals who enhance the well-being of their communities. In Nigeria, where corruption, fraud, and dishonesty are widespread, the significance of education in fostering ethical reorientation is paramount. Education holds a distinctive capacity to confront ethical dilemmas. Educational institutions function as miniature representations of society, wherein students acquire knowledge about the world while simultaneously cultivating the values and behaviors that will inform their future conduct (Uzochukwu, 2021). The function of educational institutions in the reformation of ethics and values is crucial for tackling challenges like corruption and the fragmentation of society. For educational institutions to effectively assume this responsibility, it is imperative that ethical education be woven into the curriculum across all tiers (Federal Ministry of Education, 2019). An extensive ethical education equips students with the ability to critically examine unethical practices across various domains, including business, government, and personal conduct, thereby promoting a culture rooted in integrity and accountability. Nonetheless, this obligation has been compromised by various obstacles present in the Nigerian educational framework, hindering education's capacity to function as a viable medium for ethical reorientation (Uzochukwu, 2021).

### **Challenges of Education: The Nigerian Reality**

Nigeria's education system is beset by various issues that compromise its capacity to provide quality education, especially regarding ethical development. Among these challenges are:

1. **Insufficient Infrastructure:** A significant obstacle within Nigeria's educational framework is the absence of sufficient infrastructure. A report from the Federal Ministry of Education indicates that more than 50% of public schools in Nigeria function without adequate facilities, rendering the provision of quality education exceedingly challenging (Federal Ministry of Education, 2019). The current situation, as noted by Mgbomo (2023), is marked by a deficient road network, insufficient transportation options, unreliable electricity supply, limited access to water, and deteriorating infrastructure. There is also a

shortage of lecture rooms and seating, inadequate provision of chemicals and laboratory equipment, and a lack of up-to-date textbooks, journals, and periodicals in the libraries. Indeed, within certain educational institutions, it is observed that lecturers lack designated office spaces. The absence of adequate infrastructure not only impairs academic achievement but also constrains students' opportunities to participate in activities that promote ethical growth, including group discussions, debates, and extracurricular initiatives centered on leadership and moral reasoning (Adeyemi, 2014). The deficiencies in classroom environments significantly restrict opportunities for engaging in discourse regarding ethics or civic responsibilities, as both educators and learners are predominantly preoccupied with achieving academic objectives (Ofoha, 2019). In the absence of a supportive educational atmosphere, fostering both scholarly achievement and the cultivation of ethical reasoning and moral conduct becomes a formidable challenge (Adeyemi, 2014).

2. **The caliber and preparation of educators:** Educators serve as the foundation of any educational framework and are the primary factor influencing educational results. They serve as the cornerstone of any educational framework and are essential for providing high-quality education. In Nigeria, the standard of education frequently suffers due to insufficient training, inadequate opportunities for professional growth, and unsatisfactory compensation. Uzochukwu (2021) asserts that the caliber of teacher training programs in Nigeria is inadequate, resulting in many educators receiving insufficient training. This deficiency is compounded by a lack of professional development opportunities, leaving them ill-prepared to incorporate ethical education into their pedagogy. This situation arises either from a lack of requisite training or from a curriculum that fails to emphasize moral-based education (Uzochukwu, 2021). Consequently, they frequently lack the necessary preparation to instruct on topics that demand analytical thought and moral deliberation. Furthermore, the focus within Nigerian educational institutions on examination success, rather than fostering ethical consciousness, results in the frequent oversight of subjects pertaining to civic education and moral instruction (Federal Ministry of Education, 2019). In the absence of proficient educators who can exemplify and impart ethical conduct, the aspiration for ethical reorientation via education remains elusive.
3. **Overcrowded Classrooms:** The phenomenon of overcrowding is a prevalent characteristic and a significant challenge within Nigerian educational institutions, especially in the public sector, attributable to demographic expansion and inadequate

investment in the educational framework. The swift increase in population, coupled with inadequate investment in the educational sector, compels numerous schools to enroll more students than they are capable of effectively instructing. In these contexts, educators find it challenging to provide personalized attention to learners, and the emphasis on ethical and moral education frequently takes a backseat to fundamental academic instruction (Federal Ministry of Education, 2019). The result of this situation is a decline in educational quality, leading to students being less equipped to cultivate the critical thinking and ethical reasoning abilities essential for responsible citizenship (Ofoha, 2019). This occurs as educators frequently prioritize fundamental academic instruction, thereby allocating minimal time for the ethical and value-oriented education essential for moral reorientation (Federal Ministry of Education, 2019).

4. **Corruption in the Education Sector:** Corruption represents a profound and widespread challenge within the Nigerian education sector, influencing various aspects from resource allocation to the management of examinations in Nigeria's educational framework. Instances of examination malpractices, the exchange of bribes for academic grades, and the misappropriation of funds designated for educational development are prevalent phenomena. The presence of corruption in the Nigerian education sector significantly detracts from the potential of education to serve as a means for ethical reorientation. The pervasive nature of this corruption undermines the integrity of the educational framework and establishes a detrimental precedent for students, who observe that unethical conduct is often met with reward instead of consequence (Nwagwu, 2015). This conveys a detrimental message to students, perpetuating the notion that success may be attained through morally questionable methods (Nwagwu, 2015). Such practices not only compromise the integrity of education but also establish a detrimental precedent for students, who may begin to perceive corruption as an accepted standard. This occurs as students who observe or engage in such unethical behaviors receive the impression that success can be attained through dishonest methods, thereby reinforcing a culture of corruption within society (Nwagwu, 2015).
5. **The Insufficient Emphasis on Moral Education within the Curriculum:** Although subjects such as civic education and religious studies are incorporated, they frequently occupy a subordinate position. The focus often lies on achieving exam success rather than truly comprehending and assimilating the ethical principles inherent in these disciplines.

6. **Disparities in Educational Access:** The inequality surrounding access to quality education represents a significant concern. A significant number of children in Nigeria, particularly those residing in rural regions, face barriers to obtaining quality education as a result of economic hardship. The socio-economic inequalities present in Nigeria result in disparate access to quality education. The socio-economic disparities present in the nation result in a situation where only a select few possess the means to access quality education, thereby exacerbating the moral and ethical chasm within society. The socio-economic disparity in Nigeria has led to an inequitable distribution of quality educational opportunities. Children hailing from affluent families have the opportunity to enroll in private institutions that offer superior facilities and resources, whereas those from less privileged backgrounds frequently find themselves relegated to inadequately funded public schools. This disparity not only sustains socio-economic inequality but also constrains public schools in their capacity to provide the essential value-based education required for societal reorientation (Adeyemi, 2014). The inequity in access to quality education exacerbates the chasm in societal worth as students from disadvantaged backgrounds are less likely to undergo the holistic education that fosters ethical and moral development

(Ofoha, 2019). Supporting this notion, Adeyemi (2014) contends that the inequality in access intensifies the moral and ethical divide, as students from disadvantaged backgrounds frequently lack the thorough education necessary for their ethical development.

### **Impact of Educational Challenges on Ethical and Values Reorientation**

The deficiencies within the Nigerian education system have played a significant role in the moral and ethical decline observed in society. Students frequently lack a robust grounding in ethical principles, leading to a societal landscape marked by rising instances of fraud, dishonesty, and a diminishing regard for laws and regulations. The prevailing culture of seeking expedient routes to success—be it through academic dishonesty or unethical conduct—has become deeply embedded among the younger generation. Moreover, the absence of adequate ethical instruction has resulted in a deterioration of values including reverence for elders, compassion, and social equity. The observable decline manifests in the manipulation of systems by those in positions of authority for their own benefit, alongside the troubling trend of younger generations maturing without a robust sense of civic responsibility or national pride. The difficulties within Nigeria's education system yield significant implications for ethical reorientation, as students raised in contexts where cheating, corruption, and dishonesty are

commonplace are less likely to cultivate robust moral values. Furthermore, the insufficient emphasis on moral and ethical education within the curriculum results in students being deprived of the necessary tools to critically assess their actions and make informed ethical choices. The ramifications of the difficulties within Nigeria's education system for ethical reorientation encompass:

1. **The Deterioration of Moral Principles:** The difficulties encountered within the Nigerian educational framework have played a significant role in the decline of ethical values in society. The inadequacies of educational institutions in imparting a robust understanding of ethics and critical reasoning result in a generation of young individuals lacking the essential moral framework required to address intricate societal challenges. The absence of ethical education has played a significant role in the widespread acceptance of behaviors such as dishonesty, fraud, and corruption throughout various strata of Nigerian society (Uzochukwu, 2021). From an early stage, students observe and engage in unethical behaviors such as inappropriate attire, substance abuse, sexual misconduct, and corruption, all of which erode the foundation of moral principles. Such behaviors frequently persist into adulthood, leading individuals to maintain dishonest practices in both their professional and personal spheres (Uzochukwu, 2021).
2. **The Phenomenon of Examination Malpractice and Expedient Paths to Achievement:** The pervasive culture of examination malpractice in Nigerian educational institutions serves to further entrench unethical conduct. A considerable number of students resort to dishonest practices, operating under the misconception that achievement can be attained through expedient means rather than diligent effort. This perspective extends into various facets of existence, where individuals are increasingly inclined to partake in unethical behaviors in the quest for affluence and influence. It is imperative that education undergoes reform to highlight the significance of integrity, perseverance, and the principles of ethical decision-making. (Nwagwu, 2015).
3. **The Diminution of Civic Duty and National Allegiance:** The neglect of moral-based education has led to a noticeable deterioration in civic responsibility and a waning sense of national patriotism. There is a growing trend among young Nigerians to withdraw from civic responsibilities, including voting and engaging in community service, largely due to a lack of education regarding the significance of contributing to the collective welfare. The absence of civic responsibility significantly impedes the potential for national advancement (Nwagwu, 2015). The education system should emphasize the cultivation of

patriotic values and a commitment to national duty as essential components for Nigeria to address its ethical challenges (Ofoha, 2019).

### **Enhancing Education for Ethical and Values Reorientation in Nigeria**

In Nigeria, where societal values have been compromised by corruption, materialism, and self-interest, education must assume a pivotal role in redefining the ethical framework. Educational institutions serve as essential environments in which young individuals can grasp the significance of moral integrity, patriotism, and a commitment to their nation. Nonetheless, for education to serve as a potent instrument for ethical reorientation in Nigeria, substantial reforms within the educational system are imperative. The integration of ethical reorientation should be established as a fundamental element of the national education strategy to disrupt this ongoing cycle. To tackle the ethical and value crises in Nigeria, it is imperative to implement reforms within the education sector. The subsequent strategies may assist in realigning education with the objective of moral reorientation:

1. **Curriculum Reform:** The reform of the curriculum stands as a pivotal measure in the advancement of ethical education. The existing Nigerian curriculum disproportionately prioritizes rote memorization and examination results, thereby overlooking the cultivation of critical thinking and ethical reasoning skills. The educational curriculum in Nigeria requires a thorough reexamination to emphasize the importance of ethical education. The existing curriculum requires a thorough reexamination to incorporate disciplines that emphasize ethical reasoning, civic engagement, and the principles of social equity. Courses focused on moral philosophy, civic responsibility, and social justice ought to be essential components of the educational journey, spanning from primary to tertiary levels. These topics ought to prompt students to contemplate ethical quandaries and evaluate the ramifications of their decisions on the broader community (Uzochukwu, 2021). Furthermore, initiatives that promote ethical conduct, such as scholarships for students exhibiting commendable moral character or recognition for institutions that excel in value-centered education, can contribute to fostering a culture of integrity.
